## **KCC Vice Chair Kim, Choong-Seek had talks with the Mongolian CRC Vice Chair**

**- Pledging a successful hosting of the Asia-Pacific Regulators' Roundtable** (Oct. 14-15)

In the morning of October 1<sup>st</sup>, Vice Chairman Kim, Choong-Seek of the Korea Communications Commission (KCC) met with his counterpart from the Mongolian Communications Regulatory Commission (CRC) Vice Chairman Munkhbat Buyandelger and shared views on a range of issues regarding exchanges and cooperation between the two organizations in the field of broadcasting and telecommunications.

The two sides reaffirmed achievements of mutual cooperation including human exchanges, policy consultations, digital switchover of terrestrial TV and others, and assured each other to continue the well-intentioned cooperative relations in a sustained manner. During the talks, they also shared actual cases of broadcasting and telecom policy direction, digital switchover experience, and market conditions, etc.

Vice Chairman Kim said “it is a pleasure to share with Mongolia Korea’s best broadcasting and telecommunications technologies and know-how, and our real-world experiences, larger than theoretical

lessons from books, will serve as good reference to further develop the sector in Mongolia.”

In response, the CRC Vice Chairman remarked that “Korea has given Mongolia great help in our process of switching terrestrial TV to digital” and continued that “I do hope that our mutual exchanges will deepen and widen in many areas including fee regulation, market statistics and competition.”

In the meantime, Vice Chairman Kim expressed his gratitude for the attendance of CRC Chairman Balgansuren Batsukh in the 3<sup>rd</sup> Asia-Pacific Regulators’ Roundtable jointly hosted by KCC and ITU in Seoul on October 14<sup>th</sup>~15<sup>th</sup>, and asked for Mongolia’s support and cooperation for the successful hosting of the meeting.

The CRC is an independent regulator governing broadcasting and telecommunications of Mongolia and has similar work scope to that of the KCC. Its major duties include spectrum policies, telecommunications fees and post. It signed a memorandum of understanding with the KCC in 2011 for productive cooperation in broadcasting and telecommunications.
